1 General information AP (Umbrella institution of RCA)

1.1 Academic info

As a University of Applied Sciences and Arts, AP is more than a higher education institution. AP is a learning metropolis, an enricher of talent, an amplifier of commitment and an expander of students' world view. By way of enthusiastic teachers, progressive content, direct honest orientation and maximum interaction with expertise, AP ensures that all students can realise their full potential.

AP University of Applied Sciences and Arts has a unique and diverse range of study programmes on offer. Our partnership with the Schools of Arts, wide variety of bachelor & associate degrees and custom range for professionals result in an exceptional biotope. Everyone gets the chance to follow a bespoke trajectory tailored to their specific interests and abilities. At the Schools of Arts we strive towards artistic excellence in an international context. Here at AP, students, staff and the professional field carry out education activities together.

1.2 Academic system in Belgium

The Flemish higher education system consists of 18 publicly funded higher education institutions: five universities, and 13 small and medium sized university colleges, also known as universities of applied sciences (and arts).

- Universities are research intensive universities, offering academic bachelor's degrees, master's degrees, advanced master's degrees, PhD's and postgraduate certificates.
- **Universities of applied sciences (and arts), such as AP**, are higher education institutions with a strong practice-based focus, offering associate degrees, professional bachelor's degrees, advanced bachelor's degrees and postgraduate certificates.
- The schools of arts are integrated in the universities of applied sciences and arts but offer research intensive programmes like the universities.

All institutions offer higher education according to the principles of the European Higher Education Area. Their degree programmes are accredited (i.e. officially recognised) by the Accreditation Organisation of the Netherlands and Flanders (NVAO).

1.3 Grading scale and ECTS

1.3.1 ECTS credits and workload

The Flemish Higher Education system is part of the European Higher Education Area, where we use the ECTS credit system. ECTS stands for European Credit Transfer System. A year of full-time studies at university or university of applied sciences level is generally worth 60 ECTS credits and defined as equal to 1,500 - 1,800 hours of study work. This means 1 ECTS is equal to between 25 to 30 hours.

At AP, 60 credits also represent the workload of one year's study or 30 credits for one full semester. Credits are awarded only when the course has been completed and all required examinations have been successfully taken.

1.3.2 Grading system

AP uses a grading system of 0-20 points. 10 to 20 are the passing marks, 0 to 9 are failing marks.

1.3.3 Grade conversion

Grade conversion in ECTS is the translation of a grade obtained abroad (host grade) to the local grading scale of the student (home grade).

ECTS grade conversion is mainly done in the context of student mobility such as in Erasmus+. It is always the responsibility of the home university to transfer grades obtained abroad to the final home grades mentioned on the Transcript of Records (TOR).

AP University of Applied Sciences and Arts uses EGRACONS. The Egracons tool is an online Grade Conversion Tool that enables higher education institutions to objectively convert grades received by the exchange students abroad. Partner institutions are warmly recommended to join the tool Egracons.

1.3.4 ECTS grading scale

1.4 Language

1.4.1 Language of instruction

Our programmes for exchange students are organised in English. **Level B2** (minimum) is **highly recommended for all English exchange programmes**.

We recommend incoming students to master the English language sufficiently before the exchange to participate actively during courses. If a student's proficiency in English does not allow active participation, there is a high risk of failing assignments and examinations. This is entirely **the responsibility of the student and the sending institution**.

1.4.2 Language courses

Students interested in learning some basic Dutch can participate (for free) in our welcome week. During a basic Dutch Course of 15 hours, you will learn to speak some first words and sentences. This can help you to feel more integrated in school and also in the city during your exchange.

Want to learn more? Students can take English or Dutch (or other) language lessons at their own expense in the language center of the University of Antwerp (Linguapolis). Applications and fees are to be arranged directly with [Linguapolis](#).

1.5 ICT and Laptop

You will receive your **personal login by e-mail** before the semester starts.

These login details will grant you access to a number of digital tools:

- E-campus
- AP e-mail
- Wifi
- Student intranet
- Digitap
- iBamaflex

Digitap and iBamaflex are the student information systems where you can consult your study programme, grades, class schedule etc. as soon as you arrive in Antwerp.

You will receive more information on how to access and use these tools during the welcome day. You will also receive your personal course schedule during the welcome day.

At AP we have a Bring your Own Device Policy. This means you must provide your own laptop. Computers are no longer available on campus for individual study and internet use. So you will need your **own laptop** with Internet access in all courses. This is a necessary tool to smoothly complete your studies. through your studies. You will bring your charged laptop to classes and exams. All specifications can be found on [this web page](#) or on the intranet.

Are you temporarily not in possession of a laptop due to **circumstances beyond your control**, or is your laptop **broken**? Provided you have **valid proof**, you can **apply** to borrow a laptop from the Student Center for a pre-agreed period. Exchange students can only borrow a laptop in exceptional circumstances. The number of available devices that can be lent out is limited.

1.6 Education and exams

The [Education and Examination Regulations](#) lay down the rules relating to education, examinations and the student's legal status at AP University of Applied Sciences and Arts, and can be found on our website and intranet.

They provide information on admission requirements for studies, enrolment, various types of study contracts, exemption applications, taking part in examinations, conditions to pass a study, the academic calendar, etc.

2.2 Learning agreement

Please prepare your (Digital) Learning Agreement. The learning agreement will set out the programme of study you want to follow at AP.

Please check our [website](#) to find your course list and course descriptions for your study programme at AP.

AP is ready to receive Digital Learning agreements (DLA). The DLA needs to be initiated at your home university, so please follow the instructions from your home institution. Once the DLA has been signed by yourself and your home institution, it will automatically come through in our system Mobility Online. We will link it to your application so our coordinator can check and sign it for you. You will get an automated e-mail once this is done.

If your institution does not yet support digital LA's, please contact incomingstudents@ap.be so we can allow you to upload a PDF-version.

PDF LA's are only allowed in exceptional cases:

- in case the home institution does not yet use Erasmus without Papers (EWP) - OR
- in case the home institution is EWP proof but unable to deliver a digital LA due to technical issues

You will need to upload the PDF (signed by yourself and your coordinator at home) in your workflow in mobility online, after the upload step has been released for you.

If you have an internal deadline at your home institution, make sure to draw it up in time. Our coordinators, who are responsible for signing, might be on summer leave as from July.

Courses:

Students who come study for a **complete academic year** are free to select from all regular courses as long as there are available spots in these classes. You find them on our website: ap-art.be (select your programme at the left top, next click the yellow "programme" button).

Please use the exact names of the courses!

For Music students level 3 of instruments is not allowed (because this is a public exam), you need to select level 2. Please use the exact names of the courses and specify your instrument. You are also free to select from our list of optional courses you find here: <https://www.ap-arts.be/en/node/3943> also here of course, if there are available spots in these classes.

Students who come for **one semester** can take about half of the credits of the regular courses but half credits are not allowed. For music students we have specific one-semester programmes you find here:

2.3 Cost estimation

The cost of living depends on various factors.

To have an idea of your expenses, we advise students to draw up a cost estimation beforehand. Here are some indications which will allow you to calculate your own budget.

ESTIMATED COST OF LIVING IN ANTWERP

- Room: +/- €454/month
- Utilities (water, electricity, internet, fire insurance): €40-80
- Registration residence permit: €25,10
- Bike rental: €90/year
- Living costs: €400-500/month
- Rent deposit: €900 (max 2 months' rent)
- Study materials: €100/semester (varies depending on study programme)

2.4 Housing

We advise all students staying in Belgium for a full semester to look for student accommodation at [Kotweb](#).

Kotweb is a collaboration between the city of Antwerp, the higher education institutions in Antwerp and STAN, Antwerp's student portal. It offers the largest database of student accommodation in Antwerp.

Unfortunately it is not always easy to find a room in Antwerp. Since a couple of years we are experiencing a shortage of student accommodation in Antwerp and prices are increasing. This makes it harder to find a room, especially for Erasmus students. They usually come to Antwerp for one semester only and most landlords prefer to let rooms to students for a whole academic year.

The average monthly rental price (**costs not included**) on Kotweb is:

- € 454 for a room
- € 570 for a studio (room with private bathroom and kitchenette)
- € 803 for an apartment

Expect to pay between € 40 and € 80 per month on top of this for gas, electricity, water and internet.

To help you find a suitable room, we have created an info document with tips and tricks where and how to search. You will find all detailed information in this **separate PDF**, which you will receive from us by e-mail.

Our international office and student services will also organize **an online information session** (via Teams) to help you with your search. You will receive a save the date and invitation later by e-mail.

2.5 Welcome Week AP

Exchange students who come to AP for a study exchange or traineeship will have the opportunity to learn more about the Dutch language and Antwerp culture, with the aim of preparing for their Erasmus mobility period.

During the 4 days before the start of the semester (and before the introduction week of RCA), a **Dutch Basic Language course (15 hours)** will be organized **in combination with fun activities in Antwerp**. This welcome week is highly **recommended** for all international students as it will facilitate your integration during your exchange period.

There is a contribution of maximum €40.00 for the activities. The Dutch course is for free.

We will organize an AP **welcome day** at the end of the week. During this day, you will receive a lot of practical information.

Before you leave, you need to **register online in our student administration system BaMaFlex**.

You will receive an invitation by e-mail from our student administration office with a link to complete your webregistration.

This will allow you to get your hands on your student card and to make sure that you have access to our campuses and online courses and ict-platforms.

2.8 Visa

2.8.1 Who needs a visa?

NO: If you are a **national of a European Economic Area country** (EU + Norway, Iceland and Liechtenstein) or from **Switzerland** you may travel to Belgium with an international passport or identity card. **You do not need to apply for a visa.**

You only need to bring:

- A valid international passport or identity card.
- A European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) that proves you are affiliated with a health insurance provider in your home country.

On arrival, you will have to register for a declaration of presence or a residence permit (next chapter).

NO: If you have **dual citizenship** (non-EEA and EEA) you can travel to Belgium and apply for a residence permit with the European passport on the condition that you are residing in an EEA country.

YES: when planning to stay in Belgium for more than 90 days all students with a Non-EEA nationality need to apply for a long-term visa (visa type D) before leaving for Belgium. Check out all the information on visa formalities and applications.

YES: Having a **European Union residence permit from another EEA country** is not sufficient to register in Belgium. If you travel to Belgium with only a residence permit from another European country, you will have to present the same documents to the immigration office as for a visa application and the procedure will take much longer.

YES: If you have **dual citizenship** (non-EEA and EEA) and you are residing in a non-EEA country, we recommend you to apply for a visa since the issuance of a residence permit will automatically be delayed considerably if you cannot present the European health insurance card or blue card, which is a requirement for all EEA nationals to stay in Belgium. If you apply for a visa, you will be able to settle this in advance.

All students that need a visa (indicate YES in your application form) will be able to download **an invitation letter** (model of the standard from Immigration office) in Mobility Online once their application has been approved.

2.8.2 Where to apply?

You need to apply at the Belgian embassy or consulate in your current country of residence before leaving for Belgium. Find out at which embassy or consulate you should start your visa application on the [website of Foreign Affairs](#) or on the [website of the Immigration Office](#) (in English, Dutch or French).

!!! For some countries, approval by the Belgian authorities can take up to three months or longer. Make sure you start the visa application procedure well in advance! We urge you not to come on a tourist visa alone.

2.8.3 Required documents

2.8.4 Proof of solvability

When applying for a student visa type D, students also need to prove that they have [sufficient financial means](#) to cover their living expenses and healthcare (**min 1.062 euros net/month for 2026-2027**).

This proof is preferably provided by one of the following methods:

- a certificate drawn up [in accordance with a Royal Decree] either by an international organisation or a national government, or by a community, region, province or municipality, or by an institution of higher education, to the effect that the third-country national is receiving or will soon receive a **scholarship** or a **loan**;
- a [commitment to a formal obligation](#) in accordance with annex 32 to the Royal Decree of 8 October 1981;
- any other proof of sufficient means of subsistence – for example, a certificate drawn up by the institution of higher education specifying that the third-country national has deposited a sum covering the costs of their stay in Belgium in a frozen account managed by the institution → **Blocked account procedure (Proof of Solvency)**.
This procedure is recommended for self-supporting students.

If you choose the blocked account procedure, please contact our student center via studentadministration@ap.be (put (FS) in the subject of your mail) to start up the procedure. Make sure to do this well in time, and minimum 3 weeks before your visa appointment, as the

whole procedure takes quite some time. You will need to pay the full sum of €1062 (amount for 26-27) x 6 (for semester students) on AP's bank account, and the funds will be transferred back in monthly instalments to the students bank account, opened after arrival. This procedure is not combinable with the 2 other methods.

2.8.5 Contribution for visa long stay

Non-EU nationals have to pay a contribution to cover the administrative costs of processing a long-stay visa application for Belgium by the Immigration Office. When submitting the visa application, the applicant must demonstrate that the contribution has been paid in full.

The exact amount and payment method can be found on the [website of the Immigration Office](#). International students with a scholarship issued by AP might be exempted from paying this contribution fee. Proof is required when applying for a visa, and will be supplied by AP

2.9 Residence permit

International students who are staying in Belgium for more than three months, have to apply for a residence permit, or make a declaration of presence, depending on your home country/nationality. If you don't live in Antwerp during your exchange, you have to contact the local offices yourself.

For students who live in Antwerp or the districts of Antwerp, there is a cooperation between AP and the Immigration office of Antwerp. Our student administration office will help you with your application/declaration. Do not make an appointment yourself.

You have to follow one of the four procedures. Check which procedure applies to your personal situation:

- Students from a neighboring country (France, Germany, the Netherlands, Luxembourg)
- Students from a EU/EEA country
- Students from a non-EU/non-EEA country
- Stay of 1 semester for EU/EEA countries (this is only a registration in Belgium and not a registration residence permit)
- Stay of 1 semester for non-EU/non-EEA country student studying in a EU/EEA country with a temporary residence permit in a EU/EEA country (start this procedure in time!) (this is only a registration in Belgium not a registration residence permit)

You can find the detailed procedures and required documents [here](#) on our website.

Submit the required documents to the Student Center through mobility online. You can already do this before arrival, as soon as you have your student number (sxxx)/password. You will also receive an invitation from our student admin services. Pay attention, this is a separate login and workflow. You cannot apply in your original exchange application in Mobility Online.

Our student administration office will also organize **an online information session** (via Teams) to explain the procedures and reply to your questions. You will receive an invitation later by e-mail.

2.10 Health care and Insurance

2.10.1 Accident and third party liability insurance

Incoming exchange students should be insured by their home university for accident and third party liability insurance as they are still registered as a student in their home university. This insurance should be valid during educational and recreational activities in university buildings, during transfers to and from the university and during excursions approved by the university.

If not the case, then students should make sure to insure themselves for all possible risks.

2.10.2 Fire Insurance

If you rent a property, you are responsible for damage caused by fire, water or explosion, except in circumstances beyond your control. You should take out insurance to cover these risks.

Whether you should take out an individual policy or whether these risks are insured by the policy of the landlord depends on what has been agreed upon in the rental agreement.

2.10.3 Health Insurance

Before leaving for Antwerp, students should report to their insurance company and carefully examine whether or not their health insurance covers all medical costs for the entire period of stay in Belgium. If that is not the case, they can choose to take up insurance with a local health insurance provider in Antwerp upon their arrival.

EEA Citizens

If you are a citizen of the EEA or Switzerland you remain covered through your national health care system during your period of study on the condition that you have a European Insurance Card (EHIC). You have to apply for the EHIC Card at the health insurance institution in your country of origin. You are entitled to health services in accordance with the Belgian health insurance legislation.

If you see a doctor or a specialist you will receive a receipt or 'getuigschrift voor verstrekte hulp'. Take this receipt and your European Health Insurance Card to any of the health insurance providers listed below and they will reimburse you for the costs.

Important to know

In case you transfer your residence to Belgium, you will become subject to the Belgian social security legislation. With regard to health care, you will consequently no longer be entitled to health care at the expense of the health insurance of the country of origin. You should

contact a Belgian health insurance institution which is competent for all matters related to the health insurance.

Non-EEA Citizens

If you are a non-EEA national and you come to Belgium to study then you need to be registered in the Belgian Registry of Foreign Nationals (residence permit) and Belgian health insurance is mandatory. You will also be required to pay a contribution. Depending on your personal situation you have two options:

- Insurance registration as a 'student': this option is mainly designed for students who will be studying in Belgium for a short period of time. You need to obtain a certificate from your institution which states that you have enrolled in a programme.
- Insurance registration as a 'resident in Belgium': most students can register as a resident. Condition: you need to have a (temporary) Belgian foreigner's card.

4 Travel & transport

4.1 Travel to Antwerp

From Brussels International Airport (Zaventem)

The airport is located about 45 kilometres from the centre of Antwerp.

- **By bus**

The most convenient way to reach Antwerp is by taking the Brussels Airport Express Bus, a direct coach service from the airport to the centre of Antwerp (Antwerp Central Station).

- **By train**

Antwerp Central Station is situated in the heart of the city, at about a 15 minute walk from most of the campuses. The Brussels Airport station is situated directly beneath the airport terminal. When travelling to the airport, you need your ticket to enter the airport.
